A member of the Board of Tulane and the Business School Council, Goldring and his family provided anchor gifts for the construction of the two buildings that house the A. B. Freeman School of Business, Goldring/Woldenberg Hall (1986) and Goldring/Woldenberg Hall II (2003). He and his family also donated funds to the business school to establish the <u>Goldring Institute of International Business</u> and the Malcolm S. Woldenberg Chair of Marketing. He was instrumental in establishing the <u>Goldring Center for Culinary Medicine</u> at Tulane University, the nation's first medical school teaching kitchen, and his gifts have also helped establish the Woldenberg Art Center and the Goldring Tennis Center.

Goldring received the Freeman School's Outstanding Alumnus Award in 1989. He is a past member of the President's Council at Tulane; president of the Howard-Tilton Memorial Library Association; and a recipient of the Tulane University Paul Tulane Society Award, the A. B. Freeman School of Business Distinguished Entrepreneur of the Year Award and the Dermot McGlinchey Lifetime Achievement Award.
