

Fast Company: Job Skills to Deal With Your Most Difficult Family Members

Bol offers strategies for dealing with what the author calls “boundary-busters” — family members who persist in “crossing the parameters of polite and respectful conversation to put their nose in your business.”

Take a breath and try to get to a place of understanding rather than anger. The person may just be curious about your life and have a poor way of asking questions or making conversation, says Jasmijn Bol, a professor at Tulane University’s Freeman School of Business who teaches a course on tacit knowledge. “Because depending on what the underlying motives are,

I think your approach would be different,” Bol adds.
