

Freeman honors more than 700 at graduation ceremonies

Nearly 500 bachelor's degree candidates crossed the stage to receive their diplomas from Dean Goes at the ceremony, which took place on Friday, May 20, at Avron B. The festivities kicked off at 10 a.m. with the undergraduate ceremony. Freeman School Dean Paulo Goes presided over the event, leading his first graduation

ceremony since joining the business school in August.

In his opening remarks, Goes described the volatile business environment awaiting the class of 2022, filled with challenges including the ongoing pandemic, geopolitical conflicts, climate change and disruptive automation. Despite these obstacles, Goes told graduates they would thrive thanks in large part to their time at Freeman.

“The differentiator is what you are taking away from the Freeman experience,” Goes said. “The entrepreneurial spirit, the quest for innovation and all the attributes that make you successful — problem solving, collaboration, communication, critical thinking. But above all, you will succeed because you will bring passion to everything you do. Tulane and passion, passion and Tulane. They go together!”
