Program Duration

The duration of MBA programs can vary based on the program format:

- Full-time MBA programs can take two years to complete.
- Executive MBA programs can take about 17 months to complete.
- Professional and online MBA programs can take two to four years to complete.

Depending on their prior academic background, students can complete a Master of Energy Management degree program in two semesters (about eight to nine months) or three semesters (about 12 to 15 months).

Concentrations and Specializations
